Objectives of the study

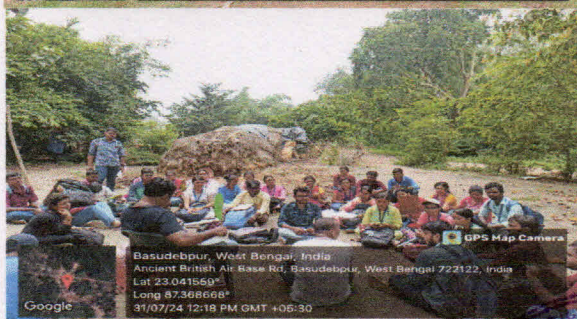
- To study the case of Human-Elephant Conflict
